1) Working on or within a designated Scheduled Monument/Area

Legislation: Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979 Part I

2) Works within designated Areas of Archaeological Importance (AAIs)

Legislation: Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979 Parts II & III

There are 7 Areas of Archaeological Importance in York. The largest covers the whole of the City Centre. The City of York online mapping outlines the location of these.

3) Working within historic villages

There are many historic villages surrounding York which contain archaeological remains (including burials). Depending on the level and location of works archaeological intervention or monitoring may be required.

If you are carrying out ground disturbing work within the **centre** of an historic village surrounding York that is **not** a designated AAI you should contact the City of York Archaeologist to discuss the area and scope of your works.




4) Greenfield sites

Large scale works on greenfield sites (i.e. sewer installation, pylon/cable installation etc) that fall outside of the planning system should also be discussed with the City Archaeologist ahead of works taking place. These may fall outside of Areas of Archaeological Importance or historic village centres.

5) Dealing with Human Remains

Legislation: Burial Act 1857 & Disused Burial Grounds Acts 1884 & 1981

Your works	What you should do	When you should do it
If you plan to develop or carry out ground disturbing works within an AAI or within certain high risk areas (Drinhouses/Tadcaster Road/Holgate).	You should ascertain the possibility of presence or absence of burials. Contact City of York Archaeologist.	Before commencement of works on the site.
If you discover bones that might be human remains on your site and don't already have an archaeologist present.	You should stop work and not cause further disturbance to the remains. For historic remains (i.e. likely over 100 years old) you should contact a local archaeological unit (who will contact the City Archaeologist) for advice. You should only contact the police if you believe the remains to be of more modern origin or suspect foul play.	Immediately on discovery and before removal.
If you plan to remove human remains from a place of burial.	Appoint an archaeologist to do this work if you haven't already done so. Obtain a Section 25 license from the Ministry of Justice. It is an offence to remove human remains from a place of burial without a Section 25 license.	Apply for license before the removal.
If you plan to erect a building on a disused burial ground that is not a church, chapel, meeting house, or other place of worship.	If your works will not involve the disturbance of human remains then you should obtain an Order from the Ministry of Justice under Section 2(2) of the 1981 Act to dispense with the requirements of Section 2(1) of the Act. If your works will involve the disturbance of human remains then you should remove the remains in accordance with the provisions of the Schedule to the 1981 Act. If you plan to carry out works within a consecrated church, chapel burial ground or other structure of the Church of England.	You must contact the Diocesan Registrar and obtain a Faculty from the Diocese of York. Contact the Diocesan Registrar.	Before commencement of works on the site.



6) <u>Dealing with Treasure</u>

A reference to operations on any land includes a reference to operations in, under or over the land in question; (section 41(I)(c) of the 1979 Act).
