
Easy Read

About this survey



City of York Council is asking people about moving to **cashless payment ticket machines** for:



• Council-owned car parks.



• Council-owned ticket machines on streets.



Cashless payment ticket machines are used to pay for car parking with no cash.



We want to know what you think about changing to cashless payment ticket machines only.



Answering these questions will help us to understand how this change might affect people.

What council parking ticket machines look like

Car park ticket machines can look like:

Why we are thinking of making this change



Fewer people are using cash to pay for parking.



Less than 1 in 10 people pay with cash at the moment, and we think fewer will in the future.



This means we are thinking of not letting people pay with cash for parking.



But first we need to understand how this might affect people. There are other ways to pay for parking, like:



• Bank card.



• Phone.



 Season ticket - where you buy parking for a few months at once.



 Residential permits - money you pay to park on your street.



People with a blue badge can park in any disabled or standard parking space for free.

Good and bad things about stopping cash payments

Making these changes will help the council by:



 Saving money we spend on collecting cash from machines - up to £90,000 per year.



 Lowering the cost of keeping machines working.



• Lowering the number of machines that are stolen or damaged, because there is cash in them.

There might be some bad effects of stopping cash payments for people who:



• Only have cash to pay for parking.



• Cannot use another way of paying.



• Do not have a smart phone.



• Do not have a bank card.



• Cannot see or get to ticket machines.

A Minster Badge - this gives people who live in York free or cheaper parking.




